Ac cording to music writer Bill Lamb,💷 popular music is defined as "th e music since industrialization in the 1800s that is most in line with the taste s💷 and interests of the urban middle class."[14] The term "pop song" was first used in 1926, in the sense of #128183; a piece of music &q uot; having popular appeal" [15] Hatch and Millward indicate that many event s in the history of recording in💷 the 1920s can be seen as the birth of the modern pop music industry, including in country, blues, and hillbilly㈒ 3; music.[16]</p> <p>The main medium of pop music is the song, often between two and a half and three and a half💷 minutes in length, generally marked by a consisten t and noticeable rhythmic element, a mainstream style and a simple traditional s tructure.[26]💷 The structure of many popular songs is that of a verse an d a chorus, the chorus serving as the portion💷 of the track that is desi gned to stick in the ear through simple repetition both musically and lyrically. The chorus💷 is often where the music builds towards and is often preced ed by " the drop" where the bass and drum parts💷 " drop out " [27] Common variants include the verse-chorus form and the thirty-two-bar form, with a focus on melodies and catchy hooks,💷 and a chorus that con trasts melodically, rhythmically and harmonically with the verse.[28] The beat a nd the melodies tend to be💷 simple, with limited harmonic accompaniment.
